
From the Vestry

Highlights from the July Vestry Meeting

- The Treasurer reported that we are \$8,900 ahead of budget year-to-date, but this is mostly due to delayed timing of expected expenses. We are hoping to close out the Capital Campaign loan repayment by receiving the final \$2,000 by the end of the 3rd quarter of 2016. And, the annual audit should be complete by the end of August.
- The Vestry approved the Outreach Committee's recommendations of donating \$1,000 to the Habitat for Humanity Interfaith Build and a donation of \$1,000 to St. James Episcopal Church, Lewisburg, WV for flood relief.
- Properties Committee continues to review quotes and schedule work including asbestos removal in church basement and painting Sanctuary roof and trim.
- Nearly 300 children attended Vacation Bible School at Grace Lutheran this year.
- Confirmation classes will run through August. Webster has the youth class and Bridget has the adult class.
- Webster reported that the region is working to build a regional ministry to support children of incarcerated parents.

From the Assistant Rector

Dear Friends in Christ,

Recently, I came across an image that has been making its way around social media outlets that I cannot seem to get out of my mind. It is a mostly black and white photo covered in words such as bullying, fear, hunger, poverty, injustice, and the like. At the center, in vibrant red, is one word, LOVE. Across the bottom is a simple tagline, "Focus on the solution." Such a simple direction and yet so difficult at times for many of us.

We find ourselves more often than we would like battling the effects of those other words. We feel overwhelmed at times by the hunger, poverty, and injustice we see, not only in our community, but around the world. As people struggle for the most basic of needs – clean water, food, clothing. We hear stories in the news of incidents of bullying in schools and unfortunately sometimes the tragic events that follow. We watch news stories from across the country and around the world of incidents of fear and terror. We live in fear of the "what ifs." What if the restructuring of my company means I lose my job? What if I don't get into the "right" college? What if there isn't enough money this month to pay all the bills? And then, just when we start to feel overwhelmed, we are somehow reminded just how strong that one-word solution is.

In scripture, we are taught and commanded to focus on the solution. To love one another as Christ loved us, with a love that goes beyond our wildest dreams and reaches us even in our darkest moments. Speaking of Paul's consistent teaching that the way of love is the most excellent way, author Brian McLaren writes, "Old markers of gender, religion, culture, and class must recede: 'There is neither Jew nor Gentile, slave nor free, male or female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus.' Old tribal indicators, count for nothing: 'The only things that counts is faith working through love.' Where the Spirit is, love is. Where the Spirit teaches, people learn love. Faith communities at their best are Spirit-schools of love, engaging everyone, from little children to great -grandparents, in lifelong learning. In the school of the Spirit, everyone majors in love."

The old life, the old way of being, the dividing lines, the propensity to look back when we should be focused on what lies ahead, must be let go of. As Episcopalians, our Baptismal Covenant demands a life that follows God by continuing in the apostles' teaching and fellowship, in the breaking of bread, in the prayers, resisting evil, repenting and returning to the Lord, proclaiming by word and example the Good News of God in Christ, seeking and serving Christ in all persons, loving our neighbor as ourselves, striving for justice and peace among all people, and respecting the dignity of every human being. This is not an easy road to journey! Yet we readily answer, "I will, with God's help."

We cannot do this alone. Jesus' single-minded focus on God's will is an example to us. We must have God's help to follow the call of Jesus in order to be the people we were created to be, people of love. God's love for us is light and life for our journey and healing for this world. When we reach out to one another in loving service, even with the simplest of things a smile, we are sharing the Good News of God's love. So let us sign up to be students in the Spirit-school of love...where everyone majors in love and focuses on the solution!

Sunday School Begins Soon!

August sees area children heading back to school already! We will begin our Sunday School year for 2016-2017 on **Sunday**, **September 11**. Classes begin at 9:30 am each Sunday and run for 45 minutes upstairs in the Parish Hall. The Sunday School classrooms surround the Commons and children are divided into several classes based on age/grade. There will be separate classes for middle school and high school youth.

The Parents' Oasis is also upstairs, providing comfortable seating, coffee, and wifi for parents waiting while their children are in class.

Sunday School registration forms will be available in the Tilford Room and on the website (www.christchurchwinchester.org). You may also complete a registration form in person on Sunday, September 11. Also on Sunday mornings, beginning on September 11, Children's Chapel is an option for young parishioners ages 3 through 7 during the first part of the 10:30 am service. It has a very simple child-sized liturgy with activities and games to get the wiggles out before joining parents in the Sanctuary at the Peace. A rotating team of parent leaders offers this ministry. There is no registration. Children are invited to participate every Sunday or from time to time as their parents choose. The Children's Chapel is also upstairs in the Parish Hall and we gather around 10:25 am.

As parents, we are called on to set the model of regular attendance for our children and to participate in their faith formation. If you are not called to be a teacher, consider being a substitute and/or helping with Children's Chapel, in the nursery, or with the younger ones during Coffee Hour. Children see where we place our values by what we do. Don't overlook those opportunities listed on the registration form!

Properties Committee



The Properties Committee is beginning the process of replacing the steps of the Old Rectory. The picture to the left shows the building around 1930. This photo is serving as an inspiration for the committee and the architect, Handley graduate Andrew Boyd, as they begin the process of creating drawings, gaining approvals, and beginning construction of a new entry to replace the current concrete steps.

The building was built in 1839 and housed rectors of Christ Church until the early 20th century. In 1939, the building became home to Sunday School and later, the church office.

Outreach Commiteee

Volunteers are needed for our Interfaith Build with Habitat for Humanity Winchester-Frederick County on Saturday, August 13, 2016, from 8:30 am to 3:00 pm in Winchester. Ideally, we will have a group of ten volunteers. Volunteers

Finance Committee

Actual versus Budget

We have about the same story as we have presented the past few months! Revenues are slightly above budget and currently expenses are under budget. We are about \$8,900 ahead of budget year-to-date, but this is mostly due to delayed timing of expected expenses. We are at a \$-16,600 balance versus a \$-25,500 budget balance through the first half of 2016. Please see the table for details:

Capital Campaign Update

We currently owe about \$12,000 to totally repay our Bell Tower Project self-loan from our Unrestricted Endowment Fund. After our latest quarterly update mailing, we have received funds and have about \$10,000 on hand that we will send to the TOTF very soon. We are hoping to close out the campaign loan repayment by receiving the final \$2,000 by the end of the 3rd quarter of 2016.

Organ Renovation Finance Update

We just sent some re-payment money to the Sanctuary Fund and now owe about \$9,000 to that investment fund. Once we have paid back the Sanctuary Fund, we will then begin to repay \$21,000 to the Organ Fund.

The remaining \$30,000 to pay back is about 18% of the \$165,000 cost of the renovation. In other words, we have already received a little over 80% of the pledged donations in the past year and a half.

Parish Nurse Musings

I hope you are having a wonderful summer. I want to discuss two subjects this time.

The first is how to get the best results in getting information when you or a family member is in the hospital. Nurses are your key to getting important information. Most nurses love to interact with you and answer your questions or find the answer for you, but they have to know what you need. Speak up and ask questions, but trust the medical team. Don't be shy about questioning something that you don't think is correct, such as a medication. This can keep you or your family member safe. An informed patient is a healthier, recovering patient!

Secondly, we need to communicate with our children about violence in our country. Never assume that a child is too young to learn. Allow or encourage your children to ask questions about what they are seeing and hearing. Answer them as is appropriate for their age. Don't add more information than they asked for, and then a little later, ask them if they understood what you said. Most violence comes from fear, and you can teach your children a lot about fear for themselves, yourself, and others by communicating with them. Be a resource for them.

If I can assist you in either communicating with your health care providers or talking with your children, feel free to contact me. See you next month.
