Haitian Boys Choir to Visit Christ Church



Les Petits Chanteurs, the boys choir of Holy Trinity Music School (*Ecole de Musique Ste. Trinité*) Episcopal church, Anglican Communion in Port-au-Prince, Haïti, will visit and perform at Christ Church on Friday, September 16. The concert will be in the Sanctuary at 7:00 pm. This amazing group has performed in the United States many times since their first visit in 1984.

The choir was founded in 1960 by the Rev. Barry Borrows, an Episcopal priest. Upon Rev. Borrow's retirement in 1978, other conductors followed, all making tremendous improvements in this group. The leading conductor is Jean-Bernard Desinat. At age seven, boys may audition to join *Les Petits Chanteurs*. The choir accepts young students from elementary schools throughout the Port-au-Prince metropolitan area.

The Holy Trinity Music School, in the past, has maintained (and is rebuilding) an enrollment of about a thousand students and a teaching staff of 45 full and part-time professionals. The school is located on the grounds of the to-be-rebuilt Holy Trinity Cathedral, the mother church of the Episcopal Diocese of Haïti, in

Port-au-Prince, and at St. James Episcopal Church in Petionville. Children attend elementary school each day until 2:30 pm. Music school staff members provide basic instruction for the elementary school in general music classes beginning at kindergarten and in music initiation, voice, winds, brass, strings and piano. The Music School operates during the afternoon and on Saturdays, and includes various beginner, intermediate and advanced orchestras and ensembles, as well as *Les Petits Chanteurs* for boys and young men.

The choir last visited Christ Church in September 2013. Please welcome them back! A free-will offering will be collected at their performance to support the Holy Trinity Music School. Hosts will be needed for these visitors for the night of September 16, and help is needed with the dinner and reception around the concert. If you would like to assist, please contact the Church Office (540-662-5843) and we will give you the details.

Rector's Message

Dear People of Christ Church,

There is a wonderful scene in the movie *Forrest Gump* as Forrest prepares to get on the bus for the first time to go to school. When Forrest hesitates before climbing the steps, the bus driver asks Forrest what is wrong. He says, "Momma says, 'Don't take rides with strangers.'" After a thoughtful and awkward pause, Forrest asks the bus driver what her name is. She tells him her name. Then, he says, "Now we ain't strangers no more," and he gets on the bus.

When we come into September and begin the program year, I think about that scene because we find new people looking to either get back into church or come to church for the first time. For those of us already in the church, we are like the bus driver—assuming that everyone knows they are welcome to come through the doors and that they know what to do when they get inside. The reality for those looking to come in is often quite different. They may not know what to do when they come inside and they may even wait to be invited to come in because they are not sure if they will be welcomed.

Don't be like the bus driver. Don't wait for those coming in to ask your name in order to find reassurance before coming up the steps! Instead, ask them their name and then, tell them yours. Ask if they need a bulletin, if they need help to find a seat, if they need help to find the Sunday School class for their children. We do not need to tell them that we have never seen them here before or ask them if they have been to church before. There is no need when we first meet people to determine, or give the impression that we are trying to determine, if they are a "valid" church-goer or not. Instead, the first step is to learn their name and to share yours.

Publishers offer countless programs to help parishes be a "welcoming community," but my favorite feedback from visitors does not come from any of those programs. The feedback is when the newcomer is in church and someone in the pew next to them offers them a hymnal already open to the hymn we are about to sing, or the prayer book open to the page we are using. It is that sort of genuine expression of welcome which people hope to find in a church when they come up the steps.

Please remember that the facilities of Christ Church are beautiful and historic, but difficult to navigate at first. Be sure to invite newcomers and visitors to join us for Sunday School or coffee hour, and then escort them to the rooms so they do not get lost or frustrated as a first impression of Christ Church. Also, if you can, please introduce them to one or two other people to help them become better known. I do not think that it is just up to the Newcomers Committee or the designated greeters to greet new faces. It is up to all of us. Maybe we should rename the Newcomers Committee as "the committee to train parishioners to welcome newcomers." (We may have to shorten that...) Each of us, by virtue of baptism, are part of the actual newcomers committee called Christ Church.

With all of the concerts, Bishop's visit and worship, and other programs going on at Christ Church this fall, we have an opportunity for lots of practice at welcoming! If you are ever concerned where to begin, a handshake and telling of your name is always a good place to start.

From the Vestry

Highlights from the August Vestry Meeting

- The budget forecast bottom line through July was within \$157.50 of Actual vs Budget! Revenue is tracking as expected, though we had hoped for a mid-year bump on unpledged contributions. We weathered the added properties expense for an elevator control board, the new duct and smoke detectors, and other painting and repairs.
- The Outreach Committee reported that American Woodmark Foundation donated \$2,000 to WATTS in the name of Christ Church. We received an unexpected gift of \$500 from the diocese for Panda Pantry.
- Webster noted the need to plan a celebration in September for the completed financial campaigns, probably on a Sunday morning. He also advised that the diocesan annual council will change from January to November, which will affect our budget process.
- Sunday school starts September 11 and ends at the end of April. A new curriculum has been ordered. There will be some changes in Youth Group, moving from meeting every weekend to the 2nd and 4th Sundays.

Church Office Reception Ministry



Many thanks to our recently retired Church Office volunteer coordinator, **Jim Petrie**. Jim served a long tenure scheduling volunteers and logged many hours himself in the Church Office greeting visitors, answering calls, and mailing newsletters. Thank you for your time, Jim!

Another Jim will take over these duties—Mr. Jim Taylor. Thank you to him for stepping into these big shoes!

As we transition from Jim to Jim, and continue to get used to a new telephone system, we will be restructuring the volunteer program in the office. We will move from having two shifts of volunteers each day to having only one on duty from 10:00 am until 2:00 pm. (The office will remain open until 4:00 pm on Monday–Thursday.) This will cover the busier times for visitors and phone calls, and reduce the number of volunteers needed each week. We will improve training for office volunteers to ensure they are confident using the new features of the phone system. And, we will clarify the policy for handling requests

for financial assistance so that volunteers are better prepared to handle those visits/calls. For those who wish to help in the office, but may prefer to do so for a shorter amount of time than a whole shift or those who may not want to work with the phone system, there are many opportunities to do administrative tasks like folding newsletters, stuffing bulletins, filing, shredding, and more. Sunday School News

When Sunday School begins on Sunday, September 11, children in preschool through 5th grade will be introduced to a new, fun lectionary-based curriculum. It's called *Whirl* (for **W**elcome, **H**ear, **R**espond, and **L**aunch). Its age-appropriate materials incorporate a brief animated video where characters model what it's like for kids to go through the questions and challenges of living out their faith with discussion and activities specific to each class to explore the theme of the week's lectionary readings. Adult Forum in September


Adult Forum meets on Sunday mornings through the program year in the Tilford Room at 9:30 am. There is no registration required, so please join us when you can.

From the Committees

Finance Committee

Capital Campaign Update

Congratulations to all! We have paid back in full to our Unrestricted Endowment the \$300,000 self loan we made to help pay for the Bell Tower project. There are still some outstanding pledges that we hope to receive and will invest to assist with other future projects that arise.

Organ Renovation Finance Update

We have paid back in full the self loan from the Sanctuary Fund that was needed to help provide cash for the Organ Renovation project. We will now begin to pay back the self-loan from the Organ Fund that was also needed to help provide cash for the Organ Renovation project.

Pledges for the Organ Renovation have time durations out through 2017. We will report our progress as we continue to receive money and pay back the Organ Fund self-loan.

Actual vs. Budget

We are now right on track! A few expenses that were budgeted earlier in the year (i.e. maintenance contract) have been received and processed, such that total expenses are now just slightly ahead of budget. Fortunately, revenues are also slightly ahead of budget. Though total expenses are now \$40,000 greater than total revenues, this is right where our budget planned for us to be.

Summer months, when attendance is lower, mean that revenues are typically down while our expenses continue at their normal levels. Our budget plan includes a year-end surge of revenue (some pledge gifts are one-time gifts received near the end of the year), where total revenue finally catches up to total expenses and the plan is to break even for the year. The table below presents a summary of revenues and expenses:





Parish Nurse Musings

As you send your children to school—grade school, high school, or college—remember that you raised them correctly and give them room to show that you did a good job. Don't be a helicopter parent. Expect the best!

We have been told so many times to “Say what you mean!” which is to be clear when communicating. Say it in ways that the other person can understand what you are trying to tell them. And, “Mean what you say.” There is not time to play games if you want results. Communicate in the fewest number of words what you are trying to convey. Last, but not least: “Don't be mean when you say it!” There are all kinds of ways to get your point across and being unpleasant is the best way for the person hearing it to be offended and not do what you are asking. This may seem that I am saying this to parents, but I am saying this to all of us as we talk to those around us. Gentle speech is better than mean speech.
