Rector's Message

Dear People of Christ Church,

Wow! It's August already - time definitely keeps marching on. I am so thankful this summer, especially, for everyone who has helped to care for one another, to teach and support our children, and for those who continue to be the Church in love and worship of our Lord. As we strive to understand what makes a faith community different from a service community, our care, worship, and compassion for each other and the community around us shows that difference.

This summer, during the months of June and July, I had the privilege of being in two Bible schools - one here at home and one in the Dominican Republic. These Bible schools were different in some ways and similar in others. It was hard work to be in the tropical heat, in a barrio, where over 80 children come from homes which we would consider cement block shacks, where neither you nor the children can drink the water; but it was fulfilling and the fellowship was joyful. It was one side of an economic and community spectrum. To be in Winchester, working with Grace Lutheran to pray, play, sing, and teach over 200 children, most of whom are not from Christ Church or Grace Lutheran, is also hard work but just as fulfilling in a very different setting. Though in different circumstances, children are the same in their love of song and play, as well as in their deep desire to know Jesus's unconditional love for each one of them.

These Bible schools are so important for children today. I find it unfortunate that we call these "vacation" Bible schools. It creates a misnomer. While these schools do go on during the summer when the kids are on vacation from school, I worry that people have come to think that these Bible schools are little more than "vacations" for their children. As I work with teachers and children and see the commitment of time and energy put into these Bible schools, I realize it's wonderfully naïve to consider Bible schools to be vacations for those leading them! I am also concerned that we lessen the value we place on these Bible schools, be it in Winchester or other parts of the world, when we hear the word "vacation." To help us affirm and celebrate the importance of Bible school for our children, I wonder what would happen if we dropped the word "vacation" or put it in quotations?

In some ways, this seems like a small concern. In other ways, it reminds us of a pervasive attitude of church as an option or something less important than other parts of life. Either way, the Bible schools are finished, and we quickly shift to August. This year, many of us will see a change in our August schedules. The school year is beginning earlier and our busy schedules start up again. Shorter summers remind us why programs such as

the Bible schools are important - lest our children miss the opportunity of community fellowship found in these experiences. Our church program schedules are also changing a bit because of the earlier school starts. While most of our program year will start in September, we have a few events happening in August to prepare for the new program year. Please be sure to read through this issue to see how we are getting ready for the program year.

Thank you to everyone who has helped with the Bible schools, other parish ministries, and for the care for one another you have shown this summer. As we regroup for the start of the program year, I hope that you will consider new ministries or programs in which you may want to participate. If you are trying to get your last bit of re-creation in before the start of things, I hope you enjoy the time away.

Highlights from July's Vestry Meeting

- The Treasurer reported on our progress paying back our endowment part of the capital campaign and appreciates people continuing to make their payments.
- Also, in the summer, annual giving typically slows down. The Treasurer reminds everyone to keep up with our giving as best we can in the summer.
- Education reported that the staff and committee will look at start dates for Christian formation programs in the future. With schools starting earlier, the committee will consider if it is also a good idea to start these programs earlier. However, for this year, the start date will be September 7.
- Stewardship welcomes the Diocese of Virginia's annual giving workshop to Christ Church. The committee and the Vestry will host the workshop and parishioners are invited to attend. (See p. 15.)
- Per recommendation from the Outreach Committee, the Vestry approved \$400 be transferred from the Outreach Committee's funds to help with the Salvation Army dinner in August. Also, the Vestry approved \$1,000 for the Navajo program. (See p. 11.)
- Parish Life invites all to the parish cookout on Sunday, August 24, following the 10:30 am service.
- Properties reports that the work on the Smith Building is underway during July. They are also working on church parking signs to help clarify which areas are reserved for Christ Church staff and parishioners.
- Rector and Vestry discussed the wonderful care and support offered among parishioners with the recent losses in the parish. The clergy and Vestry are grateful for the help and support that people gave for the funeral receptions.

From the Assistant Rector

Dear Friends in Christ,

On a recent Wednesday, the gospel appointed for the noon Eucharist was Matthew 11:25-27, which includes Jesus saying, "I thank you, Father, Lord of heaven and earth, because you have hidden these things from the wise and the intelligent and revealed them to infants; yes, Father, for such was your gracious will." During this time, it was those who were the people in positions of power and authority, who considered themselves wise, who were missing the simplicity of the Good News that Jesus came to share; that God's love was bigger than they could imagine and that God loved all. As I pondered these verses and what they held for us today, in an age in which we've been taught since pre-school that "knowledge is power," I found myself repeating the phrase, "I want to be an infant for God!"

Infancy is a time of constant growth and learning, testing the waters and our own strength, leaning on others when we can't stand on our own. Infancy is not proud of crying for help, or laughing and smiling just because. Infancy approaches each day asking God and the world to teach us something new, to call us to different and exciting things. Every step is a new adventure in infancy. Yes, I want to be an infant for God!


I think it is in our willingness to approach our life's pilgrimage of faith with this kind of openness that allows us to accept our adoption as God's sons and daughters. When we do this, when we remember that through baptism we are called to be children of the living God, we hopefully find ourselves as infants thirsting for new experiences that shape and inform us, to know Christ and make Christ known.

For me this is the key that we take what we've learned and share it. As the psalmist writes, "We will recount to generations to come the praiseworthy deeds and the power of the Lord and the wonderful works he has done." (Psalm 78:4) As we approach the beginning of the program year, I hope we all can feel comfortable enough to be infants asking God to reveal more and more to us, reminding us that we are ever learning and growing as disciples of our risen Lord, called to faith and action.

DR Mission Trip

Reflection by Rosa Gibson

The passing of the peace at la Iglesia de la Transfiguración is a meaningful experience for our mission team each visit. We jostle our way through bodies to hug everyone we know and everyone we don't. It's an unabashedly loud five minutes of the greatest representation of community that I have ever seen. Every time, we are in awe of Dominican culture, and we wish that Americans could feel that same sense of community.

This year, though, I believe we have found that bond amongst ourselves. The thirteen DR Mission team members were greeted at the airport in Santo Domingo by Karen, the missions coordinator in the DR, Ashley, our missioner to Haiti, and Emily, Karen's intern for the summer and a recent graduate of Clemson University. Karen wished us well and sent us off to Baní with Ashley and Emily, and thus, we became fifteen.

Ashley had already been on this trip with us twice, so we were used to working with her. The



invaluable knowledge she brought about life in Haiti helped us to be more culturally aware and more comfortable on the street. Emily's last name is Gibson, so, naturally, she became part of the family. Her infectious laugh, easygoing manner, and fluent Spanish gave her a vital role on the team and a special place in our hearts. At the end of the week, seated in a circle at a team meeting, she told us how welcome she had felt, and how easy it was to become part of our team. At first apprehensive of working with a group that already seemed so close, she found we had opened our circle to fit her in without a second thought.

All mission teams should be open-minded and welcoming, engaged and enthusiastic, just as the Dominican culture is. The "newness" that Emily and Ashley brought to our team gave us all the chance to sing new songs, play new games, turn the playground into a jungle, and discover what it truly means to be part of a community.

"Throughout this trip, I've taken time to sit and watch the children interacting with each other and with everyone else on the team. I've noticed how much the kids genuinely enjoy seeing us, and that even just giving them a hug means the world to them. They simply want to be with you. No matter if you're sitting and watching them play or playing with them."

Presenting Panda Pantry

Last January, Christ Church began a new outreach ministry to our community to help feed local children. While the school food program does a wonderful job feeding hungry children while they are at school, so many are hungry at home on weekends and other school breaks. With a grant awarded by the Diocese and financial support from the Outreach Committee, we established a ministry to provide meals for 30 children selected by the guidance counselor at Winchester's Frederick Douglass Elementary School. Thirty Christ Church volunteers purchased, packed, and delivered food weekly for students to take home over weekends and eat for breakfast, lunch, dinner and snacks. The stories we heard from school staff about how important this food was to students touched our hearts.

When the new school year begins in Winchester on August 11th, we will resume the ministry and, through the support of a Rotary Club grant, expand the program from 30 to 50 students!

David and Sara Bicking will help run the program this school year. Sara says, "It takes time, energy and money to respond to this overwhelming need in our community. Feeding these children is worth every bit of our effort because it helps them to focus on their learning and, in the long run, helps them to have healthier, happier lives. If Jesus could feed 5,000 people, surely we can feed 50 children!"

With the success and expansion of the program, additional volunteers are needed! Volunteers are placed on teams. Usually, a team is responsible for only one week a month. Team members spend about an hour or so a week packing food at the Baden Center. Team leaders deliver the food packages to the school. If you would like to donate an hour of your time a month as a volunteer, please contact the Bickings (540-431-5344 or westbury106@comcast.net) or the Church Office (540-662-5843).

The ministry also welcomes monetary contributions to help to purchase the food. And, we especially need your prayers for the workers and for the children.

Support for Sustainable Gardening Program in Navajoland

The Outreach Committee has given \$1000 to the Episcopal Church in Navajoland Area Mission (Good Shepherd Mission) in Ft. Defiance, Arizona. Christ Church parishioner Keith Nelson Stroud has been involved with this mission for nine years and presented to the Outreach Committee a request from the Vicar, The Rev. Chan Anaya, for help to fund a summer consultant to help them continue to grow their very successful sustainable gardening program, *Shared Abundance Experiential Learning*.

Keith said, "I have seen this program burgeon over the years and am completely convinced of its efficacy. While it has been established to serve the Navajo and to teach the rudiments of sustainable gardening for consumable food, it needs a creative and energetic leader. It is hoped that, with the proper funding, the person that they have identified as the perfect fit will be able to help the program regain its momentum and, in fact, take root as a seminal ministry at Good Shepherd and the Dine (The Navajo)."

Properties Committee News

The Properties Committee met on July 15th and discussed the following:

- The Linden tree that the City Arborist planted is not looking well and Sandy White is putting together a letter and pictures for possible tree replacement this fall.
- The bell tower painting will be completed by the end of July.
- The Smith Building brick repair work will also be completed by the end of July. (See photo to right.)
- Roger Zebarth is in the process of building a sample riser for balcony.
- We are getting bids for tree removal at the back of the Baden Center.
- A full inspection of the church was completed over two Saturdays by the "company" of Baden, Wingenbach and White. A report is being prepared.
- To reduce illegal parking in our spaces, we have priced signage for the parking lots at both the Baden Center and the leased parking spaces behind the Smith Building and have forwarded that information to the Vestry for approval. We are also confirming with the City where we are able to post signs.
- A new hot water heater is needed in the furnace room because the bottom of the existing one has rusted out. It serves the Old Rectory.
- There was an electrical incident at the Smith Building which necessitated the repair of the AC unit, circuit boards in the elevator, and several computers. We are looking into a grounding system for all our church buildings.

We are continuing to pay back the \$300,000 we borrowed from our own Endowment Fund. The Capital Campaign debt balance to the church's Endowment Fund is \$245,000. It is expected that it will be repaid in full by 2016 when all pledged funds are received.

Other News and Information

The Finance Committee is working to develop formal documentation of all the various funds/ accounts that Christ Church utilizes. Our bookkeeper, Theresa Seitz, has spent a great deal of time and effort reviewing information from Vestry minutes and other church documents starting 50 to 60 years ago and working her way to the present day.

In simple terms, there are three types of funds/accounts: 1) those used for the **Operating Budget** to pay for expenses (like our primary checking account), 2) those used for **Investments** (like our endowment fund), and 3) **Pass Through** account/funds that are used to collect monies and pay for specifically identified expenses outside of the operating budget (like gifts to pay for the Salvation Army dinners once a month).

This month, we will touch briefly on those Pass Through account/funds because they are the most misunderstood and confusing part of the church finances. Recent efforts have been made to close some of the accounts that are no longer active. At present, we have 25 Pass Through account/ funds. These are termed "Temporarily Restricted Funds." By their very nature, they are "restricted" in that funds are donated for a specific purpose, and therefore must be used for that purpose. They are also "temporary" because they may have a specific life span. (We recently closed the "Sound System" account/fund because the project had been completed and was no longer active).

Current List of Pass Through Account/Funds: Below is the current list of Pass Through account/ funds. Most you will recognize, but some you may not know about. Perhaps you have made a gift to help someone go on a mission trip, or for altar flowers, or for a specific outreach program (like a Salvation Army Dinner). These account/funds are for projects or mission work or other important church activities that are NOT IN THE OPERATING BUDGET. These Pass Through account/funds



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Parish Nurse Musings

Although we are over half-way into summer, I am hearing about more and more tickborne diseases. I just got an update from the Virginia Department of Health and want to share a little bit with you. Lyme's Disease is the most well-known of the tick-borne diseases, but there are several other diseases attacking us here in Virginia. Ehrlichiosis and Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever are also very common here. The best way to prevent becoming infected is to always use insect repellent when outside, even when not in the areas we commonly think would yield ticks. If you see a tick, remove it immediately. Do tick checks on children and pets daily. Apply pesticides and reduce tick habitat. As a final precaution, check with your health care provider if you feel you have been bitten. The sooner an infection is discovered and treated, the less likely you are to have long term effects.
