Rector's Message

Dear People of Christ Church,

I was recently asked by one of our office volunteers about my being appointed to the position of Dean of Region 14. The question was, "What does it mean for you to serve as Dean?" I thought it was a pretty good question, since we have deans of seminaries, deans of cathedrals, and deans of regions.

The easiest way to explain the Dean of the Region appointment is to cite the Constitutions and Canons of the Diocese of Virginia, which state in Canon 6, section 2:

(a) The Bishop shall appoint, with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee, one Priest in each Region as the Dean thereof. A Dean shall serve at the pleasure of the Bishop, but in no event for more than four consecutive years, and shall be the official representative of the Bishop to the Region.

Is your next question, "What is a region?" It is another good question. To help the bishop and diocese with communication, events, and other ministries around the diocese, a diocese is divided into smaller regions. (Why and how many regions varies from diocese to diocese.) The Diocese of Virginia has 15 regions and each region has a dean and a regional council made up of the clergy serving the parishes of the region, as well as lay delegates from each parish. Within the council, they elect a President, Vice President, Treasurer and Secretary. Two of the region functions are:


(a) Each Regional Council shall be responsible for seeing that the ministrations of The Episcopal Church are made available to every person living within the boundaries of such Region and shall exercise authority for the Region as a whole in safeguarding the interests and extending the ministrations of the Church throughout its borders, so that the Region may function as a unit in matters of common concern and responsibility. A Regional Council may, for these and other purposes, and subject to the approval of the Executive Board, adopt and administer a budget.

(b) Any proposal to begin missionary work or to found a Church must have the approval of the Regional Council of the Region in which such work or Church is to be established.

Among the activities of our particular region, our region supports our mission churches, our college chaplaincy programs, and discerns additional projects for the parishes to consider working on together. The region council meets quarterly and, because of our being a larger congregation, we have two delegates to the region, Diane Schnoor and Sandy White.

So, as Dean of Region 14, I support the President, Skip Barcher, with organizing meetings, addressing concerns among parishes, and by being present at our meetings. I also join with the other regional deans to meet

with the Bishop to hear or address concerns or issues around the region or diocese. I meet with the clergy in our “Regional Clericus” to discuss diocesan issues or events, review any concerns on the regional level, and have fellowship among peers.

Our previous dean, The Rev. Dwight Brown, retired this past May from Grace and St. Mary’s in Berryville after 30 years of service. While we will miss him, his departure has also made our region very much aware of the number of vacancies we currently have in Region 14 due to clergy departures for calls to other parishes or retirement. Our challenge is to continue to support the parishes who are in search. Of the 16 parishes and missions in our region, seven have vacancies. As the region continues our support of those in search processes, I would ask that you keep them in your prayers as well.

One other question that may come up for you has to do with the title associated with deans, which is the addition of the term “Very” to “The Rev.” This is our Anglican way of identifying a person serving as a dean. So occasionally, I will get mail addressed to “The Very Rev. Webster Gibson.” As we say in philosophical world, this is not an ontological change in my being human. So, once I have served as dean and am no longer dean, that “Very” will go away.

If you hear about a region meeting, or that Bridget and I are at a clericus meeting, or that I am at a dean’s meeting, hopefully you have a better idea of what I’m working on. If you have any other questions about the regions or my serving as dean, please let me know.

Thank you for asking the questions.

Highlights from the May Vestry Meeting

- The Vestry approved a request from the Outreach Committee to spend \$50 per month to supplement donations to CCAP.
- The Properties Committee is collecting bids for work on the exterior of the sanctuary, roofs, asbestos removal, and Smith Building foundation work.
- The Senior Warden read a letter from the Bishop thanking the church for the pledge to the diocese.
- Parish Weekend was a success with 58 in attendance.
- Chair sales for Apple Blossom were down due to the weather.
- There is a new procedure for distributing food cards to the needy in the Church Office. Parishioners can speak with the clergy. Others requesting assistance will need to have a written referral from CCAP prior to meeting with the clergy.

From the Assistant Rector

Dear Friends in Christ,

We have entered that long season of the liturgical year – the Season after Pentecost. The liturgical year, which begins with the Advent, provides a way for us to see afresh what God is doing, not just what God has done, but how God is actively moving in this world. As liturgics scholar Patrick Malloy explains it, “Day by day, week by week, season by season, the liturgical year provides a series of lenses through which the church can see in tiny glimpses a reality and a relationship that no human being can grasp in its entirety.” With that in mind, how then do we experience and understand our relationship with God and with one another through the lens of Pentecost?

This season begins following the Day of Pentecost when, as a church, we remember the coming of the Holy Spirit among the people and we reflect on gift of the Holy Spirit which is active in our lives. There is a sense of aliveness and movement that we associate with this time and with the Holy Spirit. In fact, the Holy Spirit is depicted in many vibrant ways: wind, breath, fire, cloud, water, a dove. Images we try to use to wrap our minds around the indescribable. Yet what our minds cannot explain, our hearts have surely experienced. Often we do not realize in the moment but when we reflect back on seasons of our lives we see the wisdom, the guidance, and the movement of the Holy Spirit through it all. It is out of this lived experience that we come to a new season with hopeful expectation of where the Holy Spirit will lead us.

Over the last few years, we as a congregation have been led to begin an outreach ministry partnership with Frederick Douglass Elementary School known as *Panda Pantry*. From the beginning, this has been a Holy Spirit moving, leading, and opening doors ministry for me. Through faithful conversations and discernment, we are now responding to an ever present need in our community. As Jeremy Welts, chair of our Outreach Committee, said recently during announcements, “Hunger does not take a vacation for the summer.” On page 8, you will find details of how you can be a part of this ministry.

In his book *We Make the Road by Walking*, Brian McLaren writes, “When we open up space for the Spirit and let the Spirit fill that space within us, we begin to change, and we become agents of change.” Some days, it may seem that the world around us is filled with more difficult situations than we can handle. The growing problem of food insecurity for children around the world often seems insurmountable. But, with each box of cereal, with each jar of jelly, lovingly bought and packed for our neighborhood children, we are making a difference. The Season after Pentecost is the perfect time for us to be intentional about opening up space within ourselves and our congregation for the Holy Spirit to fill us to overflowing. Who knows what change may come or how we might be used. And, my friends, that’s the exciting part!

Sunday School classes and Children’s Chapel will take a summer break until we begin our Fall session late in the summer.





Feeding the Hungry

As the Outreach Committee plans for our Stop Hunger Now meal-packing day on June 25, where we assemble packages to feed the hungry far from home, we have an opportunity to “practice” and support a local group of children served by our Panda Pantry during the school year. Today through June 12, we will have a food drive to serve 20 children. Food collected will be used to assemble food bags for students this summer to be distributed by our Panda Pantry partner, Frederick Douglass Elementary School. If you would like to participate, please take a card during Coffee Hour and return your donation of groceries on June 5 or 12.

Stop Hunger Now is an international hunger relief organization that coordinates the distribution of food to the world’s most destitute and hungry in a sustainable and efficient manner. More than a billion people do not have enough to eat and a child dies every six seconds from a hunger-related cause. Stop Hunger Now has provided over 17 million meals to hungry people around the world. The good news is that you can help from here in Winchester!

The Christ Church Outreach Committee is again sponsoring the Stop Hunger Now meal packaging project. The packaging will be Saturday, June 25, from 9:00 am to 12:00 Noon. Bring your family out for a fun morning and help us package thousands of highly nutritious dehydrated meals. We need many volunteers to make sure that we get the packaging done in a timely fashion. Volunteers form an assembly line to put together food packages, each of which serves six people. All ages are welcome and you can sit while you work! Watch for signup sheets in the Tilford Room.

From the Properties Committee

A few months back, the Properties Committee talked about the establishment of priorities which stemmed from a thorough review of the parish’s buildings. The committee saw two of the leading issues to be safety and structural concerns, followed by less pressing maintenance issues.

The Properties Committee wants to update you with some of the projects coming up in the next few months. As we complete the bidding process, we look forward to having some long-overdue projects completed. The main floor of the Smith Building will have the floor reinforced to make sure that the building lasts for a good long time. As part of that work, old pipes no longer used and other items left from years past will be cleared out. It is one of those projects that you probably will not notice, but if you hear banging from the basement, please know that the building is not haunted.


On the exterior of the sanctuary, we will be having the roof prepped and painted to seal it. We are also having the trim and window sills around the stained glass windows repaired and painted. Water is always a threat to buildings. With the Bell Tower project, we dealt with a good deal of water drainage issues to make sure the water went away from the buildings. This additional work, and the previous masonry work, are part of our efforts to make sure that the envelope of the church is sealed as well.

This by no means completes our list! The stewardship of the wonderful buildings we have is an ongoing process. We will keep you informed as we move ahead.

From the Finance Committee

Capital Campaign – So Close to FULL PAYBACK!

To fund the Bell Tower project several years ago, we had to borrow \$500,000 from our bank and another \$300,000 from our own Endowment. We had a very successful Capital Campaign to meet that challenge so that we will ultimately pay back all the money we borrowed. The current status is: we only have \$22,000 left to pay back to our Endowment Fund self-loan!

In summary, revenues are still down compared to budget (winter storms in January and February resulted in lower than expected attendance). However, expenses are also down compared to budget. Fortunately, the resulting bottom line is that we are better than budget year-to-date by about \$6,450!


