Dear People of Christ Church,

As we move into November, which has us trying to wrap up the church year of stewardship and get ready for Advent and Christmas just down the road, I find questions popping up which remind me of being in the car with my children when they say, "Are we there yet?"

*Are we back to normal Sunday attendance? Are we set with our annual giving? Are we going to have more people show up for our Bible Study? Are we back to doing all of those things which we remember from before Covid?*

There is a desire to know that we are past the uncertainties of the last couple years, and hope that our future is going to be known to us like our past.

The answer is no, we are not there yet if "there" means what it was like before. Our attendance is up from this time last year, but still on average is significantly below what it was in 2019. Our Sunday School and music programs are growing, but illness, travel, and other challenges make attendance inconsistent. Parish life events are coming back, but still picking up momentum.

With our annual giving, we are not there yet either, but "there" can be either a minimum to barely keep going, or more than anticipated. Either way, we are not there yet because as activity in the parish increases, we are going to need more financial resources than a minimum.

At our last Vestry meeting, I asked the Vestry to share stories about what first brought them to Christ Church, and what made them stay. Some people mentioned specific people who introduced them to other people or invited them to participate. Others mentioned comfort with the worship. These are aspects of taking a proactive approach to seek relationships and grow fellowship.

In that conversation, one vestry member asked a great question. "Who are the ambassadors for Christ Church now?" I enjoyed the Vestry reflection initially to this question when it seemed to be a rhetorical question, but it is not. The question is real. Who welcomes others? Who supports the parish staff, the parish programs, the parish resources? Who shows up to encourage others to show up? The answers are each and every one of us. It does not matter how long you have been at Christ Church. Someone hopefully greeted you and you get to share that experience by welcoming someone else. They may not be new, but if you do not know them, then you can still introduce yourself because they are new to you.

And if you find fulfilling discipleship of Jesus through the worship and ministries of Christ Church, your support in time, talent and money helps to share those ministries with others.

I wish I could say, "Yes, we are almost there," but that would be only to appease like I did with my children. If by "there" one means at some point in life when we have everything back like it was 3, 5, or 20 years ago, which we remember as comfortable, then no, we are not even close. The simple reality is we are there in relationship to Jesus through baptism and discipleship. Now, we have to figure out where Jesus calls us to go from here. And this time, we have to step up to become those ambassadors of welcome, care, support and participation, which we hopefully learned from the ambassadors who welcomed us.

## From the Clergy

**In** November, we celebrate one of my favorite days of the church year, the Feast of All Saints. It's a day that has been on the church calendar for centuries, but every year it offers us a new chance to remember those who have gone before us. It's also a chance for us to renew our own lives as Christ's followers, to think about what we learn from the saints and how they be examples to us.

One of my favorite parts of All Saints is that first word, All. Most of the feasts on the Episcopal Church's calendar celebrate one thing - one moment in Jesus's life, or one particular disciple. But the church has known for a very long time that we will never have everyone's story on the calendar, that there are just too many stories for anyone to remember all of them individually. So we celebrate All Saints, and remember all the ways people have responded to Jesus's call - from the very beginning of the church to now. We recall that we are "knit together as one communion and fellowship" with the whole church, as the All Saints collect says.

But what do we mean when we call people saints? On the one hand, the church remembers particular people because of their "heroic commitment to Christ" - that's from *Lesser Feasts and Fasts*, the Episcopal Church's book about all the people on our calendar. The names we place in the calendar at the front of the prayer book, along with the saints other denominations remember in their calendars, are people the church wants everyone to know about. But we also can talk about saints who we knew - people whose lives of faith mattered deeply to this parish, to our families, to us personally. If their life showed us what it looked like to have faith in God, to be open to the presence of the Holy Spirit, then we can celebrate them too.

We don't remember saints because they were perfect - we will find flaws in the life of any saint if we look close enough. We remember them because they were faithful, and because their lives show us something about the life of Christ, the body to which we all belong. The ultimate goal of All Saints is not just to remember the past, but to see how we too can follow Jesus in our own lives. We learn from them what it looks like to know Jesus deeply, and to live in a way that shows Jesus's love to others.

So this All Saints, reflect on the stories of faith that matter to you. Give thanks for the saints you have known, and the people who have inspired you. And seek out how you too can live out their love and faithfulness in your own life.

# From the Finance Committee

## Year End Tips

Here are a few tips shared by the Diocese as we end another year:

- Do you have a plan? As a result of not making a will during your lifetime, the state distributes your assets according to state law. Make sure you create a plan so you can ensure your intentions are carried out. Check out the Diocese of Virginia's page [www.dvagiving.org](http://www.dvagiving.org) for information and an estate planning guide.
- Don't forget to review your beneficiary designations. This is how you control who receives your investment accounts and you should review these periodically.
- If you're 70 1/2 or older, don't forget that you can make charitable donations directly from your IRA and it will not be included in your taxable income and may qualify for your required minimum distribution.

Planned giving includes so many options—from bequests, IRA rollovers, beneficiary designation gifts, charitable gift annuities—even something called “Life Estate Reserved” where you give your property to the church, but retain the right to use the property during your life. ## Pastoral Care

### End of Life Planning Workshop

This workshop was held on Saturday, October 15, and a group of parishioners learned from medical, legal, and spiritual minds about preparing for the end of life.

Some of the discussion was about a fairly new topic—palliative care. Teresa Jacobsen says, “I appreciated the in-depth discussions concerning the differences between palliative care and hospice care, and how the two very different services can work in the same community. I think a workshop on just those two services would be interesting, especially for younger generations that will be caring for their parents.”

Attorney (and parishioner) Greg Hutchinson was on hand to answer questions and provide guidance about wills, powers of attorney, and executors. Cathie Russell says, “I got a couple specific points from Greg. Be sure your family knows what funeral arrangements you've made, has a copy of your most recent will and knows where the original of that is. Keep your will updated by codicil or by writing a new one.”

There was also information presented about expressing medical wishes and working with funeral homes.

Christopher Francis says, “My takeaway from the discussion is that learning about and discussing end of life planning is a gift for your children and family members. It was a holistic, well-rounded and effective workshop.”

If you were not able to attend but have an interest in learning more, please reach out to the parish nurses to connect you to resources in the community. The Church Office can provide information on the Christ Church Columbarium and the planning packet for a memorial service/funeral at Christ Church.

# Stewardship for 2023

We have a unique opportunity to start from scratch this season of stewardship. A chance to learn or re-visit the basics of giving—why we do it, how we do it, when we do it, and what it enables Christ Church to be and to do.

Let's get back to basics.



## Being Stewards of Christ Church

Shortly after moving to Winchester, in the fall of 2016, my husband and I started attending Christ church. We were attracted to this church because of its tradition and ministries, the size of the congregation, and the location. We wanted to be actively involved in the church and knew that included volunteering and pledging.

It wasn't long before we were recruited to help with the rummage sale. The next year, we were asked to be ushers. Later, we were both involved with the Rescue Mission, Bright Futures, and, mostly, The Salvation Army. Somewhere along the line, we also volunteered to serve WATTS guests a few nights during their one week stay at Christ Church. This took us out of our comfort zone, but we adapted quickly and knew this was where we needed to be. As a result of our participation, we made several friends and learned about the different ministries. We had always pledged and donated, but these new experiences made us more aware of the need to donate time and money. We understand that Christ Church is important to our community, and that we and the congregation need to do more to support the church and its ministries.

Pledged funds are used to pay for upkeep of the buildings, utilities, security and fire systems, insurance and, to keep up with today's demands, technology. In addition, your pledges help budget for adult and children's education, pastoral care, receptions, committee meeting and coffee hours. They give us the ability to hire a new organist and choir director, continue the nurses program, and participate in a variety of outreach programs.

Do not be leery of pledging. A pledge is not a contract, but a confidential statement of what you plan to donate on a weekly or monthly basis or however you want to set it up. Your pledge will help us to figure out what the parish can do and budget for in the year ahead. Pray about and consider what amount you can pay. All pledges are welcome, no matter the amount. If you have already pledged, thank you. If you donate, but have not pledged, please consider doing so. If you haven't pledged yet, please join us in this joyful and meaningful investment in the work of our parish. Stewardship is about being grateful, responsible stewards of the gifts we received from God.
