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From the Rector

Dear People of Christ Church,

In recent classes, conversations and meetings, there is a certain theme which pops up about life and convenience. People ask about a convenient time to plan funerals, to start bringing children or spouses to church, to participate in a study group, to come to a fellowship gathering, and the list goes on and on. The unfortunate part of that convenience is that those moments of convenience rarely occur. And an even more unfortunate part of that convenience is the reality of life is that life is rarely convenient. In fact, the largest moments, and I would say the most defining moments, in life often come at inconvenient times. For those who truly believe that life is supposed to be convenient, they are not prepared for the inconvenience. As my aunt one time said after an unexpected emergency in the family at a family gathering: "We make plans, and then life happens."

A simple example recently for me was a full day planned at work, and then my son came in with a brake problem with his car. He needed a car as did my wife and I did because of going in so many directions. Schedules had to be reorganized, he got the chance to learn how to rebuild his brakes, and we made sure things were taken care of and life went on. Honestly in many ways, the inconvenience helps us to remember what our priorities are.

In our conversations about end of life planning, people don't like to talk about death, but death is rarely about convenience. The greatest challenge of the inconvenience of death is not for the person who dies, but for the family and friends left behind who never talked about death. They just wait for a convenient time or a time when they think they will be more comfortable to talk about death. It is hard to catch the families up on the inconvenient reality of death at that moment of planning a funeral because of their grief, their confusion and their lack of direction with how to respond to death. That is why we have worked so hard to offer end of life workshops.

Between these two examples, there is a wide spectrum of life where we find true, meaningful moments are actually inconvenient. I will include how a person considers their faith. Is it supposed to be a faith of convenience or inconvenience? In our life of following our Lord who confronted the ugliness of our humanity taking on death and overcoming death in the resurrection, I am sure Jesus would say that such an event was not convenient. More likely, I suspect Jesus would say that the reason he endured that inconvenience was because of God's priority in loving us and being a God whose redemptive love seeks to bring us back to God.

Even as you receive pledge cards and hear our conversations around stewardship – stewardship should challenge us to consider where God's redemptive love falls in our priorities of life. Our culture of convenience offers a lot of stuff. But the reality of life with its inconveniences shows where our true priorities are. A mature faith is one that seeks to grow in how one's life is shaped by Jesus, where the first are last, all are fed, and worship steeps us in the knowledge of our Lord whose love for us is with us in every convenient and inconvenient moment of our lives. Whereas a convenient faith is self –centered, an inconvenient faith seeks to care for others as our Lord cares for us.

However, you have to practice a life of faith that is aware of the inconvenient moments. As the Rev. Dr. John Kater reminded us in his recent sermon, those moments when you respond to someone in need, when you take time out of your day to help a neighbor, when you give up time to be with a sick person – those are the moments that define who you are. Christian faith is not about a living God who gives to us when it is convenient. It is not about God who only loves us when it is convenient. By the grace of God, God loves us unconditionally so we have the confidence to engage all of life knowing we are loved. The challenging part of such a faith is our willingness to engage this faith which seeks two things: to reflect God's love both to God and to our neighbor.

While it may be inconvenient for you and I to take the time to look at what we do with our time, our talent, our money and see what truly are our priorities, we have to make the effort to do it. Otherwise, we will wait for a convenient time which probably will not occur. When you make plans, please remember that life will still happen. Christian faith is lived out in the reality of an inconvenient life. We wait for too many things to be convenient as if that is normal. Our faith, our Lord, and our growth are shaped with inconvenience in mind.

Outreach News

Hygiene Kit Project

Thank you to everyone who has contributed to our effort to send as many hygiene kits as we can to Church World Services for distribution where needed around the world. We will begin the process of wrapping up this project both literally and figuratively through October and finish November 3.

Sunday, October 14, will be the last day to donate hygiene kits and hygiene kit supplies.

Saturday, November 3, will be "kit packaging day." People have donated so many supplies for the kits, it is wonderful. Also, because of the financial generosity of people in the parish and other groups, we have purchased additional supplies to make even more kits to send. However, we need your help to assemble the kits. We only need people on November 3; we will provide the supplies. Beginning at 9:00 am in the Tilford Room, we will organize everyone into different assembly groups to put kits together and package the kits so we can ship them to the distribution center. We are not sure how long his will take since we have not done this before, but we hope to be done by noon. To help us get a sense of how many people to expect, there is a signup sheet in the Tilford Room for you to let us know you are coming.

WATTS Training Offered

Christ Church will host WATTS from December 8 to 15, 2018. During this host week, we will welcome 35 homeless adults from our community into the Christ Church parish hall for shelter and meals. This will be our tenth year of hosting WATTS and we have enjoyed wonderful support from the parish for this very worthy program.

WATTS is an initiative of Winchester's downtown clergy with the objective of opening church facilities on a weekly rotational basis to provide a "low bar" thermal shelter and hot, nourishing meals for the homeless population in Winchester, and Frederick and Clarke counties. "Low bar" means that all homeless adults are welcome on the condition that, while in the WATTS shelter, they refrain from using alcohol and drugs, fighting and other abusive behavior. WATTS typically runs for 20 weeks from early November to late March and provides an average of 4,500 cot nights of shelter per season. The goal of WATTS is to save lives and prevent cold weather injury.

Hosting WATTS is a 24-hour a day total team effort that entails a multitude of tasks to include: cooking, serving, cleaning, registration, shopping, medical care, and even providing fellowship to our less fortunate neighbors. Last year, we also had to contend with unseasonably cold weather. In addition to our 74 Christ Church WATTS volunteers, there were teams from the Alamo Drafthouse and Cinema, McDonalds, Ledo's Pizza, the Dormition of the Virgin Mary Greek Orthodox Church, the Life in the Word of Jesus Christ Church, Shenandoah University, and others who helped with our WATTS shelter. It is truly a community effort! Our volunteers spent over 720 hours in providing 242 bed nights of shelter and sustenance. Volunteers hear heartwarming stories each year about the difference the WATTS program and volunteers make in the lives of our guests.

In preparation for our 2018 host week, there will be a short **WATTS refresher training update at noon on Sunday November 4, 2018 in the Parish Hall.** We will be available to provide more extensive information for those new to or unfamiliar with WATTS. All are welcome to come learn about the program and how to help. Finance News

Operating Budget Performance

Repeating the GREAT NEWS from last month...

The "Pre-Payments" Effect Continues. As has been reported several times already this year, due mostly to pre-payments, our year-to-date total actual revenue is still way ahead budgeted revenue (by 18% or about \$59,750). Also, actual year-to-date expenses are below budget by about \$23,200 (by 7%) such that, in total, we have a current surplus of \$56,200, rather than a budgeted deficit of \$ -26,700.

The table below shows that in total we are ahead of budget by almost \$83,000.

In August, which is normally budgeted as the second lowest revenue month of the year, we again received some unexpected (pre-payments?) pledged and unpledged gifts.

Looking Ahead

- We will not know until year end if actual total revenue will exceed budget. We do know we have actually received revenue earlier than we have budgeted for the first eight months of 2018.
- We know that expenses through the rest of 2018 will be below budget because we have not hired an assistant rector, as was budgeted for half of 2018.
- We also realize that some of the 2018 surplus may be needed to help balance the budget for 2019 if a full time assistant rector is hired before or during 2019.


While the meal is free, we are asking everyone to bring in a non-perishable food item to be donated to one of the local food pantries.


