Here are some highlights for this month. Please watch for details about events, programs, ministries, etc. in this issue of the newsletter, in the weekly email update, on the church website, in the announcements in the bulletin, and even sometimes on Facebook.

- Sunday, September 11, will be the beginning of our children's Sunday School program. Gatherings for the youth (middle and high school) have already begun and Martin Geiger can answer questions about those.
- On Sunday, September 18, the Rt. Rev. Paul Bayes, retired Bishop of Liverpool serving as a Visiting Bishop in the Diocese of Virginia, will be at the 10:30 am service for baptism, confirmations, receptions, and reaffirmation.
- The 18th is also the beginning of our Adult Forum at 9:30 am in the Tilford Room. On September 25, the Adult Forum will host Andrea Cosans, Executive Director at CCAP.
- Help is needed for worship—ushers, altar guild, chalicers, lay readers. Trainings are still being set, but we really do need help in those areas of ministry!
- Our new Music Director, Jean Lin, is also reaching out for people interested in joining the choir. Please be sure to consider if you enjoy singing!

We also have important information this month from Stewardship, Outreach, and the Diocese as things get moving again, so please keep an eye out for that information.

As I said, this September has a different pace and life to it. Getting into the groove of parish life is a wonderful gift of having community back but looking a bit different.

We welcome Visiting Bishop, the Rt. Rev. Paul Bayes, to Christ Church on Sunday, September 18, 2022.

From the Clergy

This month, for the first time in three years, Christ Church will have a visit from a bishop. It has been a long time since our last visit because of the disruptions of the pandemic, but on September 18, we will welcome the Rt. Rev. Paul Bayes, the retired Bishop of Liverpool, who will be in Virginia this fall as a Visiting Bishop.

Why is a bishop's visit important? For some people, the bishop's visit will be important because the bishop will be here to confirm or receive them into the Church. The Prayer Book calls confirmation "the rite in which we express a mature commitment in Christ, and receive strength from the Holy Spirit through prayer and the laying on of hands by a bishop." The bishop's role is to be a witness to the commitment of those being confirmed, and a symbol of the whole church's care for them. Like in a baptism, the whole congregation has a part in confirmation as well—we are there to support the people being confirmed in their life in Christ, and to share that life with them.

But for all of us, the bishop's visit has significance beyond just the confirmations he does. A bishop's visit is a reminder to us of our connection to our diocese, to the Episcopal Church, and to the church throughout the world. The bishop helps remind us that we're not on our own as Christ Church in Winchester, Virginia, but that we are connected to the whole body of Christ. The Episcopal Church's rules actually require that every congregation have a bishop's visit at least every three years, so that no congregation becomes disconnected or forgotten about. We participate in diocesan life in lots of other ways, but the bishop's visit is unique in that rather than the clergy and delegates going off to a meeting somewhere else, the bishop comes to us!

This bishop's visit will give us an especially good reminder of our connection to the larger church. Bishop Paul Bayes comes to us from a whole career of working in the Church of England, and can speak to the ways that we are both deeply connected to and different from the English church. He has a long-running connection to Virginia through the Triangle of Hope, a companion relationship between Virginia, Liverpool, and the Diocese of Kumasi in Ghana. We will actually be his very first parish visit during his time in Virginia, so we can help him learn more about the life of this diocese!

I hope you'll be here on September 18, both to hear the bishop speak at Adult Forum and for the service. As we launch into this new program year, let's remember all the ways we are connected to the larger church, and that our ministry is part of that larger body.

Welcome Back to Sunday School

Our long-awaited return to Sunday School classes will begin on September 11, 2022, with three levels preschool, Kindergarten through first grade, and grades three through five. Each class will be led by a rotating team of three teachers and will meet in the classrooms on the second floor of the Parish Hall in the rooms surrounding the Commons. Classes begin at 9:30 am on Sunday morning. Younger children will move to the Children's Chapel for music at 10:00 am while older ones remain in their classrooms until 10:15 am. Children's Chapel for ages three through second grade meets from 10:30 am until 11:00 am in the chapel. Children will brought to join their parents in the sanctuary for communion.

And don't forget our downstairs space in the church for very young parishioners who need some time to get a few wiggles out, change to a fresh diaper, etc. Take the stairs at the back of the church and take a left through the door marked "Baby Area."

Sacred Ground Circles Fall Sessions

The Diocese of Virginia will be hosting new Sacred Ground Circles beginning the week of September 11. The online cohort will explore a rich curriculum focused on Indigenous, Black, Latino, and Asian Pacific Americans as their histories intersect with European American history. For each session, you will watch documentaries and read articles to help inform and enlighten. Cohorts will then gather on Zoom for conversation to peel away the layers that have contributed to the challenges and divides of the present day—all while being deeply grounded in our faith, and the desire to live together in Beloved Community. Thank You to Pete Gronauer



In that time, Pete has given us strong stewardship over our finances, organized and structured our accounts, and kept us on a sound financial footing. We will certainly miss him.

Taking over as Treasurer from Pete is a challenge (because Pete is leaving me some big shoes to fill) but he has provided me (and all of us) with a very sound financial system and foundation to work from. Thank you, Pete!

As anyone who has sailed on the Chesapeake Bay can tell you, July and August are the months to go to the mountains. The Bay is notorious for its weak winds, leaving sailors stranded in the doldrums. Looking at our financial charts shows that July and August are not our strongest months either. The revenues (primarily pledges) in the budget project this historical weakness while the actual revenues were weaker than expected. The good news is that our actual deficit is not as much as the budget projected due to strong giving earlier in the year. Now, as we start our program year and get fully reengaged, the budget projections are for an upturn. Its time for us to come out of our doldrums!

Stewardship for 2023

We have a unique opportunity to start from scratch this season of stewardship. A chance to learn or re-visit the basics of giving—why we do it, how we do it, when we do it, and what it enables Christ Church to be and to do.

Let's get back to basics.



What is a pledge?

A pledge is a commitment to give to Christ Church in the year ahead. The pledge card asks you to think and pray about what you are called to give, and then to communicate that amount by filling out the card. Your pledge helps us figure out what the parish can do and budget for in the year ahead. By giving, we live out our commitment to "work, pray, and give for the spread of the kingdom of God" (Book of Common Prayer, p. 856).

Is my pledge a binding contract?

No, a pledge is a statement of intent, not a contract. It's an estimate of giving, made in good faith. It's not like paying a tax, membership dues, or a mortgage. If your finances change where you cannot maintain your pledge, just simply advise the church bookkeeper that you wish to modify your pledge. And, if your financial situation improves, increasing your pledge is always available!

How much should I pledge?

That decision is always yours, hopefully after prayerful consideration. It's helpful to think about your pledge in terms of a proportion or percentage of your annual income. Some people calculate an amount like one hour's income per week, or one day's income per month. A chart that shows proportional giving at different income levels is at www.christchurchwinchester.org/stewardship.

How do I make a pledge?

Pledge cards are mailed to everyone. You can also print one from the website or submit your pledge electronically. You can return your pledge card via the offering plate on Sunday, at the Church Office, or mail it to the Bookkeeper. Instructions are on the back of the card!

Is my pledge confidential?

Yes, only the church bookkeeper knows the amount of individual pledges. She prepares quarterly statements that are sent to keep people abreast of their giving throughout the year.

If I pledged last year, do I need to fill out a card again?

Yes; we base our budget on the amounts people pledge specifically for the next year, and don't simply assume your pledge will continue. Filling out a card every year is a way to reflect on your commitment and what you want it to look like in the year ahead.

How do I fulfill my pledge?

You will receive a set of envelopes for checks, which you can drop in the offering plate on Sundays, or mail to the church office. If you'd like to set up electronic bill pay for your pledge, call our bookkeeper to learn how you can do that with your bank.


Outreach Committee

Focus on Winchester Rescue Mission

In September, the Outreach Committee is focused on the Winchester Rescue Mission (WRM), one of the designated ministries of Christ Church. Their main building is easy to spot on North Cameron St. because of the wonderful mural on the side of the building. It is the home to approximately 35 men, with another smaller location for eight women. The WRM has purchased a larger building on Valley Ave., with renovation plans to accommodate more men and a few families. When that becomes a reality, the present location will house women.

What does the WRM do? The WRM provides immediate help for the homeless in crisis with shelter, meals, clothing, and supplies to stabilize the situation. Each resident is assigned a case manager who addresses the deeper issues that affect the homeless, such as mental illness, substance abuse, literacy, and financial challenges. They provide an individual plan with achievable goals to help the individual progress towards stability and self-sufficiency. In 2021, 33 individuals were moved from chronically homeless to successfully housed and contributing citizens in our community.

Additionally, the WRM outreach programs include a food pantry serving 1,200 boxes of food per month and community meals serving over 5,000 meals each month. Christ Church parishioners are helping with feeding the WRM residents and Winchester's hungry. Two groups cook dinner each month on the second Monday and the fourth Tuesday. Additionally, the casserole ministry continues with over 20 parishioners making a casserole every other month for the WRM to use to feed residents and community members. Using the same recipe, each participating parishioner delivers their prepared casserole on a designated Sunday and the dishes are delivered to the WRM at the beginning of each week.



During the month of September, we will be collecting paper plates, paper towels and toilet paper to restock WRM as they care for Winchester's hungry and homeless. As you do your shopping this month, please pick up some extras for the Winchester Rescue Mission and bring them to church on Sunday or deliver to the Church Office at 114 W. Boscawen Street on Wednesdays between 10:00 am and 2:00 pm.
