Dear People of Christ Church,

December of 2021 is perhaps the most “Advent” month for me in our work as a parish. This is a season marked as a countdown in preparing the return or arrival of our Lord, the buildup to that most festive day marking the birth of Jesus who was and is and is to come as the incarnate Lord—the one in whom and through whom God establishes a human, “fleshy,” incarnational, saving relationship with humanity. We are preparing as we wait for our Lord's return.

Rather than just sit around and wait, this pandemic and our hope to see it wane over the next few months has given us the opportunity to minister as our Lord calls us to do. We have much to prepare for. For a variety of reasons, our ministries need more ministers. We need you to be a part of our ministries. We need ushers, acolytes, altar guild, video worship ministry, cooks, clothing and food delivery, choir, property upkeep, knitters, chalicers, readers, welcomers, and more...

Not all of these are up and running right now, which gives us time to prepare. I have found some confusion that people think each ministry is the same no matter what the parish. Such is not the case! Come talk with the ministry leaders, share what you have done, see what we do here, and if you feel called to participate. Or take this opportunity to explore something you haven't done before at church. In this time of preparation, you can “try on” a ministry or two, learning what they do, and find your fit. Invite someone to learn about ministries with you.

This time of preparing and practicing is also the chance to invite those who have done these ministries for years to come and re-learn what we do. Many of our ministries have changed in the past few years—some a smidge and others a good bit. So re-learning our ministries is not just for people newer to the parish. This applies to everyone.

Advent is that moment when you find the answer to the question, “But what has the Church done for me?” The answer is quite clear: the Church has invited you to discover a deeper, more meaningful relationship with Christ's family, the church, as one of Jesus' disciples ministering with His other disciples in worship, formation, service and care. That is the gift of Holy Baptism - always getting prepared in anticipation of greeting our Lord on his return.

From the Clergy

In Luke's account of the Gospel, which we will be hearing from most Sundays for the next year, John the Baptist appears to proclaim the arrival of Jesus, and he does so by quoting Isaiah. "The voice of one crying out in the wilderness: 'Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight.'" (Luke 3:4) John the Baptist's message to the people is about how to prepare, how to be ready for God when God arrives among them. John urges the people of Israel to take action as they prepare, to repent of sin, to practice justice toward the neighbors, to share with those who are in need. The good news, in John's account, requires an active response from us, as we try to make our lives ready for God's presence.

In Advent, we remember this work of preparation that John the Baptist called his people to. The Advent collects instruct us to "put on the armor of light," to "forsake our sins," and to allow God to "purify our consciences." But we also know Advent to be a season of waiting, a time when we are looking forward to something that has not yet happened yet. In Advent we wait: both for our celebration of Christ's birth at Christmas, and in anticipation of Christ's return.

These two verbs of Advent—*prepare* and *wait*—can seem like an odd fit. Our usual idea of waiting is really waiting around - sitting with nothing to do until your name is called, or standing in line. Preparing, on the other hand, sounds active, bustling around making everything ready. But in Advent we are called to do both—to prepare our hearts and our lives to celebrate Christ's coming among us, and to wait, to be patient and thoughtful during this time of anticipation. So how do we do both at once?

The British theologian Paula Gooder has one idea. In her book on Advent, *The Meaning is in the Waiting*, she suggests that we need to remember what waiting really looks like in a spiritual sense. Far from being useless time, what we need is active waiting, the sort that tries to live as attentively as possible to each moment as it happens. Active waiting isn't about sitting around wishing Christmas would get here already, but about paying attention to each day and each hour as an opportunity to deepen our connection to God and each other. We can do this kind of waiting even as we do all the work of preparation for Christmas: prayer and pie-baking, wrapping presents and reading Scripture.

So whatever sort of preparation we find ourselves doing in Advent, remember that we can wait while we do it. We can learn to pay attention to God, and make Advent more than a countdown to Christmas, but its own time of knowing and loving the One who comes for our salvation.

Christian Formation for Children

We will continue to meet from 9:45-10:15 am in the Sunday School Commons for our Advent program. Each week, we are lighting candles on an Advent wreath, learning more about what we do in Advent and why, learning the first verse of a traditional carol that we hear in church at Christmas, and taking part in a creative activity to remind us of what we have learned. Our music segment has been recorded in the choir loft by Ted Dix and Phil Sargent and is available for additional practicing on our YouTube channel (Christ Episcopal Church—Winchester, Virginia).

This Christmas Eve, children are invited to attend the 4:30 pm service dressed as a figure from the Nativity narrative and participate in a parade led by the Christmas star. Even without rehearsals and costumed or not, we will involve every child who wants to take part in the celebration of Jesus's birth!

Note: Beginning in December, the downstairs space in the church that we have been using for young children during the first half of the 10:30 am service will return to being a changing room/break time for infants and toddlers. It will not be staffed, but has toys and other materials for those who need a few minutes to wiggle. The audio of the service is broadcast so that parents can follow the service while giving the smallest parishioners a break.

We will return to having the children use the Children's Chapel in the Sunday School Commons (on the second floor of the Parish Hall) during the first part of the 10:30 am service. The chapel leaders will lead a short service followed by activities for the kids. They will be brought to the sanctuary to join their parents at the Peace.

Please be aware that the doors to the Parish Hall lock automatically at 10:30 am as part of our security protocol. If you are a few minutes late, you can still get to the Sunday School Commons through the church. Just head up the side aisle on the pulpit side. Enter the door to the Tilford Room on your right, go through the Tilford Room to the foyer, and up the stairs as you normally would.

Christian Formation for Adults

Our Adult Forum Advent program continues in the Tilford Room at 9:30 am each Sunday in Advent. (Masks required.) We will use a new curriculum called “Journeying the Way of Love.” We’ll talk about passages from the beginning of Luke’s Gospel as a pattern for our own journey as disciples trying to love God and our neighbors. We’ll also talk about different spiritual practices that can help us on that journey, including [an Advent calendar of practices to try out each day](#). Even if you can’t join us for Adult Forum, we invite you to try out the calendar as you prepare for Christmas.

From the Treasurer

How will we end the year financially?

Regular readers know that the reporting of financial information is always two months behind in the Angelus due to submission deadlines, document creation, and then circulation. So, the information herein does not include November results.

The table below shows the detail Revenue and Expense totals by category for Actual and Budget for the first TEN months of 2021. It shows we are ahead of budget still, now by about \$62,000. Unfortunately, we are at a negative net position of about \$54,000.

We will recognize the PPP loan forgiveness in December which we hope, along with a strong November and December, will get us close to break-even for the year.

Our budget still shows about \$115,000 of expenses for both November and December. Since some pledges have been paid in full already, along with some new pledges received early in the year, it is hard to guess where we will end the 2021 year. **Please keep up with your donations** and help us move from a deficit to break-even or even a positive year-end net position!

From the Outreach Committee

As 2021 comes to a close, the Outreach Committee wants to say “Thank you” to the whole congregation for all of your work supporting and carrying out the mission of Christ Church to meet the needs of our neighbors, and to make Christ known as we do so. Here are some of the things we accomplished this year:

Your efforts and generosity have meant that Christ Church has been able to:

- Support the WATTS shelter for our week in February, providing shelter for approximately 30 guests every night despite the challenges of COVID
- Provide and serve dinner for upwards of 50 people twice a month at the Winchester Rescue Mission, along with our new casserole ministry so they have extra meals on hand when needed
- Pack food bags to go home with Winchester-area students through Bright Futures, at +500 bags a session
- Provide food and clothing to CCAP’s clients, including over 200 cans of yams in just the last few weeks!
- Provide groceries to the Salvation Army’s feeding program on a monthly basis
- Provide several dinners to Kids Club students and their families, giving their community a chance to eat together
- Provide Christmas presents to 110 children through the Salvation Army Angel Tree program

The Outreach operating budget, which comes directly from pledged income to Christ Church, primarily was used to support these ministries in the past year, particularly providing food we pack for Bright Futures, groceries for the Salvation Army, and the ingredients for Rescue Mission dinners. Additionally, The Outreach Committee responded to donation needs from the Blue Ridge Area Food Bank, WATTS, Salvation Army’s Red Kettle program, and CCAP’s Financial Assistance program.
